

Ladakh stalemate to end soon?

inistry of Home Affairs, Government of India appears to have made fresh efforts to end the stalemate persisting over the participation of two frontline groups--Leh Apex Body (LAB) and Kargil Democratic Alliance (KDA)--spearheading struggle for major demands of Ladakhi people after the Centre recently constituted a High-Powered Committee to ensure the protection of land and employment for local people of the region. It is heartening to hear that two sides may achieve some breakthrough to end the deadlock as the MHA emissary has reportedly established a contact with LAB chairman and former Lok Sabha member Thupstan Chhewang. The media reports suggested that the MHA could alter composition of the HPC so that a dialogue process is initiated. Two frontline organizations have also written a joint letter to Union Home Minister Amit Shah suggesting that, to begin with, dialogue should be initiated with two representatives each of LAB and KDA with the provision of wider participation. Ladakh leadership's U-turn from its longstanding demand of the Union Territory status to full-fledged statehood to Ladakh has formed the basis for two ideologically-different and communally-sensitive districts--Kargil and Leh--to iron out differences and display a rare unity for "restoration of democracy" in the region. The biggest example of bringing an end to their differences was the recent amicable resolution of construction of a Gonpa in Kargil town, which was bone of contention between two districts for the last more than six decades. There had been several disputes between Leh and Kargil people, some on communal lines, for several decades and the people of two districts always took different stands on a particular subject but the developments (after the abrogation of Article 370) forced the right-thinking and constructive people to end their differences and fight unitedly to save Ladakh from bureaucratic rule. Though Kargil people never supported the demand for UT status to Ladakh, it was Leh people who had been demanding UT status for Ladakh and they have now realized that they have got UT status having nothing for Ladakhi people. With the presence of some right-thinking people in LAB and KDA, two districts have been successful in cementing rare unity for a common cause of full-fledged statehood for Ladakh. The BIP, which rules Ladakh Autonomous Hill Development Council (LAHDC) Leh, has stayed away from the agitational programme in Ladakh. The BJP has distanced itself from the LAB as well as KDA on the ground that the grant of Union Territory was a major demand of Ladakhis, which was accepted by the Central Government on August 5, 2019. The need of the hour is that two sides should reach an agreement and come to the table to resolve all issues for the betterment of strategically-important Ladakh region. Both sides should display flexibility while negotiating on contentious issues to end the ongoing impasse

SLOW SUBSIDENCE OF SCIENTIFIC INSTITUTIONS

Suppression of scientific information or expert knowledge has serious ramifications for the application of science for the public good. THE Joshimath crisis has laid bare another equally serious chal-lenge - the slow subsidence of Indian scientific research councils and academic institutions. Their and academic institutions. Their foundational ground of rational and independent thinking, new ideas and scientific discourse is slowly sinking. Like Joshimath town, which has been experiencing a gradual subsidence, the crisis in our scientific research organisations has been in the making for some time.

A significant flashpoint came on January 11, with the Hyderabadbased National Remote Sensing Centre (NRSC) — an arm of the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) — coming out Organisation (ISRO) — coming out with a preliminary assessment of the Joshimath subsidence based on remote-sensing data. It reported the truth as seen from space — the town had sunk up to 9 cm between April and November 2022, and more rapidly between December 27 and January 8. It was the first crientiffs ground to the december 2022 and part of the project of the p scientific report that pointed to the gravity of the situation in

Joshimath.


Instead of acknowledging the seriousness and accepting that it had failed to act in time, the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) issued a gap order on scientific institutions, telling them not to share any information or opinion on Joshimath with the public through the traditional or social media.

Among the scientific institutions

Among the scientific institutions asked to keep mum are not just the NRSC and ISRO but also research labs belonging to different scientiflabs belonging to different scienti-ic agencies — the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research, Department of Science and Technology, Ministry of Water Resources, Indian Institute of Technology-Roorkee as well as the Survey of India and Geological Survey of India.

Survey of India.

The NDMA order is unprecedented and brazen. Neither the NDMA nor the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) under which it Affairs (MHA) under which it functions is the parent body of any of the scientific organisations being aggged. It is a political decision since the NDMA order mentions that it was taken at a meeting chaired by the Home Minister. Even if it was so, scientific agencies like the ISRO and CSIR are autonomous bodies (at least, on



Home Secretary transgressed his powers by calling a meeting of sec-retaries of all scientific depart-ments and abolished hundreds of ments and abolished hundreds of awards given to scientists and researchers in one go. The Indian Council of Agricultural Research recently warned working and retired scientists against deviating from the official position on genetically modified food. Those not following the diktat were warned of action against them.

Discussions based on scientific observations and the sharing of that information in the public domain should be encouraged. In many sectors, including remote

Geological Survey. There are genetic sequence databases accessi-ble to researchers from all over the ble to researchers from all over the world. A part of the assessment the NRSC put out is based on imageries from the Sentinel-1 satel-lite of the European Space Agency (ESA). This satellite has a Synthetic Aperture Radar which helps it acquire data even through cloud cover and during day or night time under all weather conditions. The second part of the NRSC assess-

ment is based on imageries iron the Indian satellite, Cartosat-2S, which provides panchromatic imagery y with a resolution of 0.65. The NRSC must be compli olution of 0.65 mented, not gagged, for coming up with the analysis using remotewith the analysis using remote-sensing data from the ESA and ISRO. Shockingly, the NDMA finds the analysis as something that is "creating confusion among affected residents and also among citizens of the country."

The discussion on the usability of the remote-sensing data is tak-ing place in the context of Uttarakhand because its capital, Debradun, is the birthplace of remote-sensing studies in India. It

IRS-1A in 1988. Today, the space agency has four series of sophisticated remote-sensing satellites -Resourcesat, Cartosat, Oceansa Resourcesat, Cartosat, Oceansat and RISAT. A landmark contribu-tion of the ISRO in the 1980s was using remote-sensing data for the preparation of a forest map of India which showed large-scale

eforestation. This finding was at variance with the maps produced by the Forest Survey of India (FSI). The ISRO and NRSC (then known as the National Remote Sensing Agency), however, were not asked to keep shut. Instead, the FSI was made to incorporate the remotesensing-based technique in its mapping process. This resulted in a far more accurate assessment of the forest cover over the years

Nowadays, research councils, academic institutions and science academies are shying away from such discussions



Need to raise standard of education in rural India

THE Indian Republic is no longer young. It is turning 73. It is also on the way to becoming the most populous country in the world, leav-ing China behind. What is more, the fertility ing China behind. What is more, the fertility rate (the number of children that a woman is likely to bear during her reproductive years) has fallen below the replacement level of 2.2. This means the country will case to reap the demographic dividend — a large number of youngsters will not be there to join the workforce to take care of an increasingly ageing population that has stopped earning.

At this juncture, the country needs to execute a dramatic shift in the economic policy so that the youngsters joining the workforce

that the youngsters joining the workforce henceforth can be more productive, contribut-ing more to the economy than was the case

ing more to the economy than was the case earlier. This requires a shift in political perceptions, social policy and public spending. Foremost, the policy must seek to bring down the maternal and infant mortality rates, improve nutrition levels and expand training. This will allow healthy mothers to go back to work after giving birth and their babies to grow up to become healthy youngsters and robust workers. The youngsters must be properly educated so that after completing schooling they are able to access vocational training ing they are able to access vocational training and acquire skills which enable them to work with increasingly sophisticated technology. Instead of running lathe machines, they would need to operate digitally driven work

stations.

On farms, they will have to grow crops using less water and deliver the right level and mix of plant nutrients instead of simply



dumping chemical fertilisers. And post-har-vest, they must know how to market the pro-duce at best prices by accessing farm informa-tion portals and joining farmer produce organisations, which sell at the best price available, instead of simply dumping the crop with the least partial than the product of the price at the nearest mandi or the first middleman who arrives at the village after harvest with cash. They should take loans from a microfi-LINEY SHOULD take loans from a microfi-nance organisation or bank-linked self-help groups, instead of falling prey to local money-lenders.

This in itself is a tall order, but it is not enough. Right now, there is a mini crisis at hand. Gains in learning skills from schooling have received a setback as a result of school

closure during the pandemic and inadequa-cies of learning from home via the digital ne-work. Now that schools have reopened, ther needs to be an emergency national plan so that children can have the same level of read-ing, writing and comprehension skills that they would have had if the pandemic had not

struck.

Lastly, the system must develop the infrastructure for retraining workers so that they
can handle newer machines. In Scandinavian
countries, workers are paid to go on study
leave so that with reskilling they are able to
operate the newest machines which have just
been installed at factories. This will raise the
productivity level of a worker and take care of

the impact of fewer workers as a result of

Fewer babies being born.

A comprehensive agenda for action to address all these issues has been formulated address all these issues has been formulated by the global civil society organisation, Oxfam. Its first point is to raise the tax burden on the rich and lower it on the poor. It can be done by imposing a wealth tax on the wealthy and reducing the tax burden on the poor by lowering the GST rates on essential items which the poor have to consume in order to

which the poor have to consume in order to keep hunger and destitution at bay. With the fiscal resources so gained, the prime policy objective would be to improve access to public services like health and edu cation. Foremost, the budgetary allocation to the health sector has to be increa sed to the tar the health sector has to be increased to the tar-get of 2.5 pr cent of GDP by 2025, as envis-aged in the National Health Policy. This will lead to the poor needing to spend less out of pocket for emergency medical treatment as public healthcare delivery will improve as a result of higher budgetary allocation.

This will happen when more and better pri-nary and community health centres and medical colleges, along with district hospitals, are established. The latter will raise the supply of established. The latter will raise the supply of paramedics and doctors to man the extended healthcare system. Simultaneously, says Oxfam, the budgetary allocation for education must be raised to 6 per cent of the GDP, as outlined in the National Education Policy. The increased resource allocation and provisioning of educational capacity must have a specific focus: concentrate more on areas which have a large number of members from deprived communities like the Scheduled Castes and Tribes and girls across the board.

As the poor get better healthcare and educa-As the poor get better healthcare and educa-tion, their households must be brought under a wider social security network. This is essen-tial as 90 per cent of India's labour force is engaged in the informal sector where a day's absence from work or inability to find work means loss of a day's income without a fall-back.

The circle of entitlement will not be com-pleted if a labourer has to think twice before taking an ill family member to a well-provid-ed public health centre because it will mean staying away from work for a day and, there-by, losing a day's wages. Besides, just as there is a system of anganwadis to take care of pre-school children, there has to be an elaborate pension provision for all so that those too old to earn do not become a severe burden on

to earn do not become a severe burden on their families. In order for all this to happen, the citizenry must know what to seek from their leaders, both politicians aspiring for office and offi-cials manning the administration. For this, the citizenry needs to be made wise on what is its due and ask for it in a coherent manner. This is do fo beling the citizenry to correctly articus, job of helping the citizenry to correctly articu-late its demand and insist on adequate delivlate its demand and insist on adequate delivery has to be done initially by civil society organisations. Over time, politicians aspiring for power, from the panchayat level onwards, must know what they have to promise and deliver to the electorate for them to not just acquire power but retain it.

As the message travels up the political lader, political parties at the apex will have to formulate the right platforms to acquire power and deliver on the promises to remain in power.

than outside influence, like intu-tive eating, according to Wendy Lopez, a registered dietitian. "With intuitive eating, instead of focusing on external food roles to guide your eating choices, one of the goals is to cultivate trust in yourself when it comes to food and the innate instincts that you have," she says. Lopez, who co-hosts nutrition podcast "Food Heaven" will Jessica Jones, is promoting a new

loss, she adds. "Intuitive eating kind of helps quiet the noise, and you're able to tune into what [eat-ing] habits work best for you,"

Lopez says. Here are some obstacles you may face as you adjust from adhering to social standards that surround eating, and begin to eat intuitively. Plus, how to over2 things to know about intu-

itive eating

1. You can still meal plan and meal prep

Eating intuitively doesn't mean sacrificing structure altogether, says Lopez. In fact, you should still eat at least three meals a day, she notes.
"You also want to make sure

of intuitive eating is also honor-ing your health and honoring your nutrition. So, it's important that you're getting the nutrients you need," Lopez says. Instead of sticking to specific foods, aim for variety and you'll still be eating intuitively, she adds.

You can also use the MyPlate method to ensure that most of your plate is planned around plant-based foods, and you're eceiving carbohydrates, protein nd grains in each meal, says

Lopez.

2. You can count calories ini-

2. For can count carores initially, but don't make it a habit
Regardless of if you're eating
intuitively or not, you should be
aiming for at least 500 calories per

meal, Lopez says.
"I don't recommend counting calories. But, if you're under-eat-ing, it might be helpful to count calories for a few days, unless you've been medically advised to

actually meeting your minimum needs," she says.

If you're following the MyPlate method, then you're likely meeting the recommended calorie intake, Lopez says. Consider adding avocados, nuts and seeds to your meals to up your intake.

"There is a misconception that you just gat whatever you want."

you just eat whatever you want, whenever you want. But, part of intuitive eating is also listening to your body and how you feel,

your body and how you feel,"
Lopez says. If after eating something too often, your body isn't
reacting well to it, consider
reducing your consumption.

Once deemed a disease of the affluent, the prevalence of Type 2 diabetes now cuts across all social, demo-ranhic and age groups, they had

graphic and age groups, they had said. They attributed this higher and earlier incidence of Type 2 diabetes in part to the "South Asian phenotype," a genetic pre-disposition that makes Indians

disposition that makes Indians more susceptible to insulin resistance and Type 2 diabetes. "That was the first free-living study to demonstrate the health benefits of including almonds in the diet among Asian Indians with Type 2 diabetes," said Dr Gulati, who was lead researcher.

High inflammatory diet found to increase likelihood of depression. new study finds



new study published in the Journal of between a highly inflammatory diet and an

A between a highly inflammatory diet and an increased risk for depression.

And the researchers state their findings will have an impact on public health, as it's an indication that a controlled diet could potentially help those with depression or prevent the illness in the first place. The participants included 30,627 individuals from the U.S. who had been studied in the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES), a program of studies designed to assess the health and nutritional status of adults and children in the United States from 2007 to 2018. States from 2007 to 2018.

The study aimed to assess the association between

The study aimed to assess the association between the dietary inflammatory index (DII), which is a scoring algorithm designed to estimate how diet impacts inflammation in the body and health outcomes as a result, to the cross-sectional study of NHANES.

The participants were asked questions regarding which foods they consume as their diet, and were given a score based on their dietary inflammation, and also rated for depression.

Based off this data, the researchers found what is called a J-shaped relationship, which is defined, according to academics, as a non-linear relationship between two variables and appears as a curve that

between two variables and appears as a curve that initially falls, but then rises to become higher than the

starting point, between DII and depression.

Meaning, at a set point, the amount of inflammation within the body appeared to exceed the body's

tion within the body appeared to exceed the body's capacity.

Then, as the J-shape indicates, the high inflammation in the body of the participants was found to begin to correlate with a significantly higher risk for depression for participants.

This J-shaped relationship showed a positive association between depression and inflammation, which remained intact even after the researchers adjusted for factors such as demographic data, lifestyle habits, disease, body mass index (BMI), and C-Reactive Protein (CRP), which is the level of a certain protein that your liver makes that results if bodily inflammathat your liver makes that results if bodily inflamma

tion is too high.

This confirmed the association of high inflamma tion and depression in U.S. adults, according to study

Research has linked a high intake of inflammatory foods, such as sugar and fat and a low intake of fruits and vegetables, to chronic diseases such as diabetes, cancer, and coronary heart disease, to name a few.

Meanwhile, other studies have shown that the Mediterranean diet, which is a low-inflammatory diet consisting of high amounts of vegetables and fruits, more seafood than meat and other high healthy-fat foods like olive oil, actually can aid in

preventing, or improving chronic diseases.

And while past studies have found that many And while past studies have found that many chronic diseases can actually get worse as a result of chronic inflammation in the body, which is known as a slow, long-term inflammation lasting for prolonged periods of several months to years, depression car also worsen from this chronic inflammation.

Want to stop sugar spike after meals? Eating almonds before can help, even reverse diabetes

With strapped devices, test subjects, who had almonds, showed a significant 20 per cent drop in their post-prandial sugar spikes. If you take 20 grams of almonds about 30 minutes almonds about 30 minutes before each of the three major meals of the day, then this collective pre-meal load of 60 gms can actually cut back your post-prandial blood glucose spike by 20 per cent. Yes, an India-specific study has finally proved this corrective nature of the nut. Almonds were chosen as a pre-meal load because of their familiarity among Indians, their concentration of mono-unsatuconcentration of mono-unsatu-rated fatty acid (MUFA), fibres

This study was authored by Dr This study was authored by ID Seema Gulati, Centre for Nutrition Research, National Diabetes, Obesity, and Cholesterol Foundation (NDOC), and Dr Anoop Misra, Chairman, Fortis CDOC Hospital for Diabetes and Allied Sciences. "We have published this research in two papers. The first, which studies the immediate

which studies the immediate effect, has been published in the European Journal of Clinical Nutrition, and the second paper, which assesses the long term effect of pre-meal almond load, has been published in Clinical Nutrition ESPEN. Both are peer-Gulati.

"The study is significant "The study is significant because most Indians are so both-ered about their fasting glucose that they rarely bother about watching their post-prandial glu-cose level, which is usually high-er given the composition and car-bohydrate-heavy nature of our main meals of the day. What many do not realise is that the post-meal sugar spike is the first indication of the onset of Type 2 diabetes. Uncontrolled, the ele-vated levels would also reflect in the fasting sugar tests down the line. The beneficial rolldown the fasting sugar tests down the line. The beneficial rolldown effect of consuming almonds before meals can not only halt the progression of Type 2 diabetes but also raise the chances of reversing it in early onset cases. In short, it can prevent complica-tions related to diabetes," says she

This myth stems from conflating fruit juices – which can raise blood sugar levels because of their high sugar and low fiber content – with whole fruits.

But research has found that this isn't the case. Some studies show, for instance, that those who consume one serving of whole fruit per day – particularly blueberries, grapes and apples – have a lower risk of developing Type 2 diabetes.

And other research suggests that if you already have Type 2 diabetes, eating whole fruits can help control

your blood sugar.

It's time to bust this myth, said Dr
Linda Shiue, an internist and the
director of culinary medicine and
lifestyle medicine at Kaiser lifestyle medicine at Kaiser Permanente San Francisco, adding that everyone – including those with Type 2 diabetes – can benefit from the health-promoting nutrients in fruit such as fiber, vitamins, minerals and itioxidants. Myth No 5: Plant milk is healthiei

Myth No 5: Plant milk is healthier than dairy milk.

There's a perception that plant-based milks, such as those made from oats, almonds, rice and hemp, are more nutritious than cow's milk. "It's just not true," said Kathleen Merrigan, a professor of sustainable food systems at Arizona State University and a former US deputy secretary of agriculture. Consider protein:

Typically, cow's milk has about 8 grams of protein per cup, whereas almond milk typically has around 1 or 2 grams per cup, and oat milk usually has around 2 or 3 grams per cup. While the nutrition of plant-based beverages can vary, Merrigan said, many have more added ingredients—such as edicing and added surgers. such as sodium and added sugars, which can contribute to poor health -

breast cancer. Fat-free foods are healthier than high-fat foods. Vegans and vegetarians are deficient in protein. Some false ideas about nutrition seem to linger in American culture like a terrible song stuck in your head.

So, to set the record straight, we asked 10 of the top nutrition experts in the United States a simple question. What is one nutrition myth you wish would go away – and why? Here's what they said.

Myth No 1: Fresh fruits and vegetables are always healthier than canned, frozen or dried varieties.

Despite the endurine helief that

Despite the enduring belief that fresh is best," research has found that frozen, canned and dried fruits

that frozen, canned and dried fruits and vegetables can be just as nutritious as their fresh counterparts.

"They can also be a money saver and an easy way to make sure there are always fruits and vegetables available at home," said Saria Bleica outgoing director of nutrition security and health equity at the US Department of Agriculture and a professor of public health policy at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. One caveat: Some canned, frozen and dried varieties contain sneaky ingredients such as added sneaky ingredients such as added Bleich said, so be sure to read nutri-tion labels and opt for products that keep those ingredients to a minimum. Myth No 2: All fat is bad.

Myth No 2: All fat is bad. When studies published in the late 1940s found correlations between high-fat diets and high levels of cholesterol, experts reasoned that if you reduced the amount of total fats in your diet, your risk for heart disease would go down. By the 1980s, doctors, federal health experts, the food industry and the news media were reporting that a low-fat diet could benefit everyone, even though there was no solid evidence that doing so would prevent issues such as heart would prevent issues such as heart disease or overweight and obesity.

Dr Vijaya Surampudi, an assistant rofessor of medicine at the UCLA professor of medicine at the UCLA Center for Human Nutrition, said that as a result, the vilification of fats led many people – and food manufac-turers – to replace calories from fat with calories from refined carbohy-drates such as white flour and added sugar. (Remember SnackWell's?) "Instead of helping the country slim, the rates of overweight and obe-sity went up significantly," she said. In reality, Surampudi added, not all

In reality, Surampudi added, not all fats are bad. Although certain types of fats, including saturated and trans



fats, can increase your risk for conditions such as heart disease and stroke healthy fats - such as monounsaturated fats (found in olive and other plant ed fats (found in olive and other plant oils, avocados, and certain nuts and seeds) and polyumsaturated fats (found in sunflower and other plant oils, walnuts, fish and flaxseeds) – actually help reduce your risk. Good fats are also important for supplying energy, producing important hormones, supporting cell function and aiding in the absorption of some nutrients.

If you see a product labeled "fatfree," don't automatically assume it is healthy, Surampudi said. Instead, prioritize products with simple ingredi-Myth No 3: 'Calories in, calories out' is the most important factor for

long-term weight gain.

It's true that if you consume more as true that it you consume more calories than you burn, you will probably gain weight. And if you burn more calories than you consume, you will probably lose weight – at least for the chest test.

The order also provides that new
Fair Price Shops (FFS) will be opened

Ward/ULB and only a local unenployed educated (at least matriculate)
individual in the age group of 18 to 45
years, will be eligible to apply for a
Fair Price Shops license.
